- 1. Write briefly on any two of the following:
  - i) The different types of goods.
  - ii) The obligations of the seller and the buyer in a sale of goods contract.

- 2. With the use of relevant authorities, compare and contrast an ordinary sale of goods contract with the sale of goods at an auction, clearly showing the position of the parties in each case.

Mama Mboga, a vegetable retailer at Gikomba Market, Nairobi, goes to Mama Serah, a dealer in vegetables at Wakulima Market, Nairobi, and selects one Kilo of tomatoes and one kilo of cabbages, which she puts in a plastic bag, then
